We each completed our respective training in October of 1943, and coincidentally were ordered to report to Salt Lake City, Utah, are where they were assembling B-17 Crews. When I sow my brother there, I asked the tratical officer if he would put us together in the same crew, and he did. This was after the five Sullivan brothers went down with their ships in the Pacific theater of operations, after which brothers were not allowed together in the same comfat zone.

We left Salt fake City for Pyote, Jepas for three morths of Combat training, picked up a new B-17 in Kearney, Nebraska and blew it over to Prestwick, Scotland with our new crew during the end of February, 1944. From there, we were assigned as a replacement Crew in the 351 5 Bomb Group stationed in Ridgewell, England, FIH A.F. After a few practice missione, we flew our first combat mission on april 10, 1944 to Brussels, Belgium. By May 1974 we had flown II missions which included 4 raids on Berlin, Germany.

On the last week in may, our crew was transferred to the 200 Bomb Group, 15 to A.F., stationed in Foggio, Italy. From that air Bose, we flew 20 more missions, including 3 to the Ploesti, Romania oil refineries. Our lost mission was on August 14, 1944,

to the port of Joulan, France, in support of the invasion of Southern France. With the completion of our required number of Combat missione, we returned home on the USS Seneral Squier in September, 1944.
