#### RESOLUTION NO. 3889

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARROLLTON, TEXAS, ADOPTING THE PROGRAM YEAR 2014 CONSOLIDATED ANNUAL PERFORMANCE AND EVALUATION REPORT FOR THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Carrollton received \$731,079 in Community Development Block Grant funds from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development in Program Year (PY) 2014; and has prepared a Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER); and

WHEREAS, the Neighborhood Advisory Commission reviewed the draft Program Year 2014 CAPER; and

WHEREAS, on November 12, 2015, the Neighborhood Advisory Commission held a public hearing on the draft PY 2014 CAPER, and, after all persons were given an opportunity to present verbal and written testimony, did consider and make recommendation to adopt the PY 2014 CAPER; and

WHEREAS, the City Council, after having made the draft PY 2014 CAPER available for public review in accordance with Federal law, conducted a public hearing on December 15, 2015, and thereby provided all persons with an opportunity to present verbal and written testimony for a period in excess of thirty days; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has concluded that the adoption of the PY 2014 CAPER is in the best interest of the City and is for the purpose of continued participation in the program and in securing additional community development resources for the primary benefit of low and moderate income citizens;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARROLLTON, TEXAS, THAT:

#### SECTION 1.

The PY 2014 CAPER, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes, documents the performance and accomplishments of the Community Development Block Grant program as related to the adopted 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan and is hereby adopted by the City Council.

#### SECTION 2.

This report will constitute the PY 2014 CAPER for the City of Carrollton, Texas for all matters related to program planning, accomplishments, and performance relative to the Community

Development Block Grant program and other programs administered by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The following Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report represents the first year completed under the City of Carrollton's 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan. The objective of the City of Carrollton's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program is to support activities which meet at least one of the primary national CDBG objectives, i.e. development of viable urban communities by providing a suitable living environment, decent housing and expansion of economic opportunities for persons of low and moderate income. Based on the needs analysis in 2014, the following strategy areas were identified and are reaffirmed in this annual report.

- 1. <u>Improve Neighborhood Infrastructure:</u> Use CDBG funds to leverage infrastructure improvements.
- 2. <u>Enhance Code Enforcement:</u> Use CDBG funds to pay for one salaried code enforcement officer to work in 2014-2018 CDBG Target area.
- 3. <u>Provide Neighborhood Matching Grants:</u> Use general funds to create a more proactive municipal presence in order to preserve and enhance neighborhoods throughout the city.
- 4. <u>Preserve Existing Housing Stock:</u> Use CDBG and general funds to provide interior and exterior home repairs for income qualifying homeowners.
- 5. <u>Assist Social Service Providers:</u> Use general funds for the enhancement of services to meet the needs of low-to-moderate income citizens.
- 6. <u>Promote Economic Development:</u> Use general funds for the improvement of aging retail spaces.

#### **RESOURCES AVAILABLE**

The City of Carrollton is an entitlement community under HUD's CDBG Program. During the 2014 Program Year, October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015, \$1,003,940.37 in CDBG funds were made available to the City of Carrollton, \$731,079 in PY 2014 funds and \$269,708.82 in prior year cost savings to further the objectives of the 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan:

- 77% \$768,662 dedicated for infrastructure improvement in the Carrollton Downs subdivision in the Rhoton Park Neighborhood
- 7% \$75,000 for Jimmy Porter Park Pavilion N.O.T.I.C.E. project
- 4% \$40,000 dedicated to grant administration and planning
- 5.5% \$58,341 for Enhanced Code Enforcement in CDBG target area
- 6% \$60,000 dedicated to Minor Home Repair for interiors and exterior repairs
- 1% \$10,000 for Emergency Repair grant as part of the Housing Rehabilitation Program
- .5% \$5,000 for People Helping People as part of the Housing Rehabilitation Program

The City of Carrollton made available general funds to meet the goals and objectives in the following amounts:

\$1,764,167 for infrastructure improvements in the Woodlake #3 Phase I N.O.T.I.C.E. area

- \$355,320 to enhance local social service agencies activities for Carrollton's vulnerable populations
- \$110,000 to fund two staff positions implementing CDBG and Neighborhood Partnership activities
- \$65,000 for beautification and identity programs through the Neighborhood Enhancement Matching Grant Program
- \$15,000 for Neighborhood Empowerment Zone minor home repair projects
- \$8,000 for Single Family Rehabilitation Incentives for homeowners of all income levels in the Neighborhood Empowerment Zones
- \$1,857,241 for infrastructure improvements in the Carrollton Downs Phase I N.O.T.I.C.E. project
- \$38,410 for design, demolition and lighting of Jimmy Porter Park Pavilion N.O.T.I.C.E. project

In PY 2014 the City of Carrollton accomplished all of the proposed outcomes and five out of the six goals identified in the 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan. The City of Carrollton spent over 90 percent of the PY 2014 CDBG allocation within the year but also allocated an additional \$4,217,138 in general funds towards the identified goals.

#### <u>Improve Neighborhood Infrastructure:</u>


- N.O.T.I.C.E. Carrollton Downs Phase I (CDBG Funds \$768,662, General Funds \$1,857,241):
  Provided 8,560 linear feet of street paving. Alley and sewer replacement included over 8,620 linear feet of new construction for one hundred and eighty eight homes.
- N.O.T.I.C.E. Jimmy Porter Park (CDBG Funds \$75,000, General Funds \$38,410): Installed a new pavilion and lighting in Jimmy Porter Park.
- N.O.T.I.C.E. Woodlake #3 (General Funds \$1,764,167): Provided 4,847 linear feet of street paving, 7,250 linear feet of sidewalk replacement and 4,500 linear feet of new sewer lines for one hundred and six homes.
  - <u>Enhance Code Enforcement (CDBG Funds \$58, 341):</u> Resolved 2,291 new code enforcement cases in CDBG target area.

<u>Provide Neighborhood Matching Grants (General Funds \$60,000)</u>: Funded three neighborhood beautification activities and four neighborhood identity sign topper grants.

#### Preserve Existing Housing Stock:

- The Minor Home Repair Program (CDBG Funds \$60,000): successfully implemented twelve projects to assist low-to-moderate income homeowners with minor interior and exterior home repairs such as: painting, siding, soffit, trim repair and roofing projects.
- The Emergency Repair Grant (CDBG Funds \$10,000): successfully completed three projects to assist low to moderate income homeowners with interior and exterior emergency repairs such as AC/heating unit repair and roofing work.
- The People Helping People Program (CDBG Funds \$5,000): successfully completed five volunteer projects to assist low-to-moderate income homeowners with minor exterior home repairs.
- Neighborhood Empowerment Zone Minor Home Repair (General Funds \$15,000): successfully
  completed two repair projects to assist low to moderate income home owners with exterior
  repairs such as sewer line repair and drainage issues.
- <u>Single Family Rehab Incentive (General Funds \$8,000):</u> successfully completed four driveway renovation projects

<u>Assist Social Service Providers (General Funds \$355,320):</u> Served 16,556 low to moderate income individuals in Carrollton of which 68 percent of the funding reached Carrollton's extremely low income population.


#### **Narrative**

Housing rehabilitation projects accounted for 10 percent of the total CDBG funding in PY 2014. The table above accounts for the distribution by race of the housing activities. In PY 2014 20 homes were rehabilitated using CDBG funds. Hispanic recipients accounted for 40 percent of the clients, Black, 10 percent and White, 50 percent. This closely resembles the racial and ethnic makeup in Carrollton according to the 2013 American Communities survey in which 67 percent of the population was White, 9 percent was Black and 31 percent was Hispanic.

Neighborhoods receiving improvements in Carrollton are ranked according to infrastructure needs and low income status. In PY 2014, 89.5 percent of CDBG funds were allocated for neighborhood projects located in minority, primarily Hispanic, concentrated areas. In 2013 the Hispanic ethnic group accounted for 31 percent of Carrollton's population, and the Hispanic poverty rate was twice as high as other ethnic and racial groups. The Carrollton Downs subdivision in the Rhoton Park Neighborhood, in Census tract 137.15, block group 1, Jimmy Porter Park in the Hill 'n Dale Neighborhood in Census tract 137.18, and enhanced code enforcement efforts were focused on southwest Carrollton in the A.W. Perry, Carrollton Heights, Carrollton Highlands, Hill 'n Dale, Holiday Park, Old Downtown Carrollton, Rhoton Park, and Woodcrest Estates neighborhoods

The map below shows where Hispanic concentrated tracts are located in Carrollton. The calculation is based on the following definition: A minority concentrated area is any neighborhood or Census tract in which: 1) The percentage of households in a particular racial or ethnic minority group is at least 20 percentage points higher than the percentage of that minority group for the housing market areas; 2) The total percentage of minority persons is at least 20 percentage points higher than the total percentage of all minorities in the housing market areas as a whole; or 3) If a metropolitan area, the

total percentage of minority persons exceeds 50 percent of its population. The housing market area is the region where it is likely that renters and purchasers would be drawn for a particular housing project. Generally the housing market area is the county.



The following table illustrates the total number and demographic characteristics of individuals served by the social services agencies that received general funds from the City of Carrollton in PY 2014 (Fiscal Year 2015). Of Carrollton residents 3 percent of the clients served were Asian, 67 percent were White, 24 percent were Black or African American, 5 percent were of a mixed or unknown race. Fifty-two percent of the clients identified themselves as Hispanic. In the American Communities Survey for 2013 Carrollton's ethnic and racial breakdown was roughly 14 percent Asian, 67 percent White, 9 percent Black and 31 percent Hispanic. The data show that Black and Hispanic families are utilizing social services resources at a higher rate as compared to their population than other races or ethnicities.

#### Narrative

In the 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan the City of Carrollton identified the preservation of existing housing stock as a priority. There are currently three housing rehabilitation programs in the City of Carrollton CDBG program: the Minor Home Repair, the Emergency Repair Grant and the People Helping People Program. These programs are not limited to a specific geographic area but are only for low to moderate income homeowners that live within the City of Carrollton limits, \$75,000 or 7.5 percent of the total CDBG allotment was dedicated to housing rehabilitation projects for low to moderate income homeowners.

In PY 2014 the CDBG funding allocated for housing rehabilitation was:

#### • 6% for Minor Home Repair

The Minor Home Repair program is an interior/exterior home repair program targeting low income homeowners in Carrollton. The funding is not a grant but instead a deferred loan in which homeowners are required to live in their homes between 3 - 5 years in exchange for loan repayment. In PY 2014 \$60,000 was allocated for the program and a total of 12 homes were repaired for items such as painting, siding, roofing and drywall.

#### • 1% for Emergency Repair Grant

The Emergency Repair Grant is an interior/exterior home repair program targeting low income homeowners in Carrollton. This grant targets items in need of immediate attention. It provides up to \$5,000 in repairs that present an immediate health and safety issues for the resident such as AC/heating units, water heaters and plumbing. It is the only program that allows mobile homes to qualify. In PY 2014 \$10,000 was allocated for this new program, and three homes, including two mobile homes, were completed.

#### • .5% for People Helping People

The People Helping People Grant is a minor exterior home repair program targeting low income homeowners in Carrollton. This grant uses local volunteer groups to complete needed repairs and updates. It provides funding for supplies and tools for the volunteers to complete work such as

painting and minor siding repairs. In PY 2014 \$5,000 was allocated for this new program, and five homes were completed.

#### Narrative

For the 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan, low income areas were identified based on the 2008-2012 and 2013 American Community Survey (ACS) and the 2014 HUD income designations for the DFW metro region. In Carrollton for a Census tract to be designated low income, over 42.5 percent of the population must live at 20% or below the designated median family income for the area. In Carrollton the median income for a family of four is \$67,561, for example for a family of four to be considered low income they must make less than \$56,301 a year. During the 2014 Action Plan year, the City of Carrollton allocated 89.5 percent of all CDBG funding to the designated low income census tracts, designating the funding specifically for the *Neighborhood Oriented Targeted Infrastructure and Code Enforcement (N.O.T.I.C.E.) program.* 

The City's N.O.T.I.C.E. program focuses on low- income neighborhoods to provide safe streets, sidewalks, alleys and utility lines. This program has been a vital change agent in the community and it positively impacts the quality of life of the citizens. In general, the N.O.T.I.C.E. program targets financial resources for the design and implementation of all necessary street, sidewalk, and water and sewer line projects in one neighborhood at a time until the entire public infrastructure in that area has been repaired or reconstructed. In addition, the City conducts targeted and strengthened code enforcement efforts in the same neighborhood to foster a greater sense of neighborhood pride and an overall healthier community. Finally the City follows up with improvements to public parks and/or other neighborhood facilities.

In PY 2014 the CDBG funding allocated in the 2014-2018 Target Areas was

#### • 77% for N.O.T.I.C.E. Carrollton Downs Phase I

Phase I was a total cost of \$768,662.56 of CDBG funds. Forty-three percent of the residents in this area are low income and it is a Hispanic resident concentrated census tract.

#### • 5.5% for Enhanced Code Enforcement

In PY 2014 \$58,341 in CDBG funds was spent on code enforcement focusing on the low income census tracts in southwest Carrollton. The low income population in the CDBG Code Area is 59.7 percent and is located in a Hispanic concentrated resident area. The utilization of Enhanced Code Enforcement preserves infrastructure repairs and ensures that the improved aesthetic and structural quality of the neighborhood will last.

#### • 7% for N.O.T.I.C.E. Jimmy Porter Park

In PY 2014 a new pavilion was constructed in Jimmy Porter Park, located in the Hill 'n Dale neighborhood. Jimmy Porter Park is located in a census tract with a 44 percent of the residents living in the low income range and is also a Hispanic resident concentrated neighborhood.

**N.O.T.I.C.E.** Carrollton Downs Phase 1. Since beginning the N.O.T.I.C.E. program in 2001, the City of Carrollton has been able to complete needed infrastructure improvements by breaking up large, seemingly impossible projects into smaller, more manageable endeavors. Each project has requested annual CDBG funding rather than a large lump sum payment or using bond funding for attacking the entire project at once. Because Carrollton has pursued funding on a year-to-year basis, we have secured CDBG funding and leveraged general funds on each project. This has allowed Carrollton to focus and complete more projects than just using general funds. Carrollton Downs Phase I completed the alleys, streets and sewer lines for one hundred eighty-eight homes. With a total cost for the project at \$2,943,699 general funds accounted for 63 percent of the total project. In PY 2014 \$768,662 was allocated in CDBG funds and \$317,795 of PY 2015 funds will bring the total CDBG funding to 37 percent of the total cost.

**N.O.T.I.C.E. Jimmy Porter Park Pavilion.** As a continuation of the PY 2011-2013 N.O.T.I.C.E. infrastructure improvements in the Hill 'n Dale neighborhood a new pavilion and additional lighting along the back side of the park were needed. Using CDBG dollars the City was able to leverage the completion of the new pavilion and lighting. Total cost for the project was \$113,410. CDBG funds total \$75,000 and accounted for 66 percent of the total project costs.

**People Helping People.** In PY 2014 the City of Carrollton reinstated the People Helping People Program, a program that provides minor exterior repairs for low income homeowners. In PY 2015 \$5,000 in CDBG funding was allocated and five homes were completed. For the five homes completed 68 volunteers worked for a total of 544 hours that accounted for over \$5,440 in-kind donations of volunteer hours. Additional donations of food, supplies and tools accounted for an additional \$2,500.

Assist Service Providers: Since 1998 the City's Community Development Program has worked to develop partnerships throughout the community. In PY 2014 the City of Carrollton committed to continue to support social service agencies by providing \$355,320 in general funds for eight different service providers that serve primarily low to moderate income residents in Carrollton. This funding in all cases amounts to less than 30 percent of the entire budget of any social service provider, yet was used to leverage and add to many existing programs. These programs, discussed in more detail in section CR-25 of this report, create necessary social safety nets for Carrollton's vulnerable populations and prevent overuse of other public services staff like police, school districts, courts and emergency personnel.

#### **Narrative Information**

The City of Carrollton expanded its housing rehabilitation program in PY 2014. The Minor Home Repair program was improved to include interior repairs and address accessibility issues. This year the maximum expenditure per home per year was raised from \$5,000 to \$10,000 with a \$45,000 lifetime limit. Carrollton also added two additional housing rehabilitation activities, the People Helping People and the Emergency Repair Grant. Funding for all housing rehabilitation projects was increased from \$45,000 in PY 2013 to \$75,000 in PY 2014. The new programs and the 67 percent increase in funding led to a doubling of the number of homes repaired in PY 2014 compared to PY 2013. All three programs provide low to moderate income homeowners with assistance for interior and exterior repairs on their homes.

One hundred percent of all CDBG funding for the housing rehabilitation program was dedicated to persons of low to moderate income and were for needed repairs affecting the safety and long-term sustainability of the homes and surrounding neighborhood. Twenty homes were completed in PY 2014, an increase of nine homes from PY 2013. Of these homes eleven, or 55 percent, were occupied by extremely low income homeowners and nine or 45 percent were from low income families. Senior homeowners accounted for seven homes, or 35 percent of the projects in PY 2014 and female head of household accounted for twelve homes, or 60 percent of the projects completed.

### Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

For the strategies addressing the homeless and non-homeless with special needs populations included in the 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan, the City continued to allocate a portion of its General Fund towards grants and donations for Carrollton service providers that target low to moderate income residents. In that role the City also provides information, referral and technical assistance along with financial support to local agencies serving the homeless and non-homeless citizens with special needs. While to date no homeless programs have been funded with CDBG resources, the City provided general funds to Metrocrest Services in PY 2014 an amount of \$300,000 and Christian Community Action \$3,320 for the assistance to anti-poverty initiatives, homelessness prevention and special needs populations.

The table below illustrates the individuals assisted by income level and by agency last year. Of the total population of individuals served in PY 2014 through our social service agencies strategy programs 68 percent were categorized as extremely low income. To be categorized as extremely low income, for example, a family of four would have to earn less than \$24,249 a year.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Carrollton does not receive Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funding.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

As noted previously, the City Council made available \$355,320 in general fund resources to fund agencies which are actively engaged in the provision of social services in Carrollton.

In exchange for the funding, the agencies and organizations work closely with the City in the provision of social services to all citizens in need. The close partnership the City has with each agency grows with each year of collaboration. The staff who are employed as part of the CDBG grant administration and planning activity provide technical, referral and capacity building assistance for the agencies on an ongoing basis.

The table below identifies some of the principal partners for the City's PY 2014 (Fiscal Year 2015) priority funding for Carrollton's social service agencies:

In PY 2014, the City helped accomplish the following goals through its local non-profit partners in an attempt to reduce the overall number of persons living in poverty in Carrollton:

- Funded food pantries in both Dallas and Denton counties in Carrollton.
- Improved access to preventative care, basic health care and medical services for low to
  moderate income families thus reducing costs for medical services and expensive trips to the
  emergency room.
- Improved the linkage between job training programs and local job creation efforts to attract
  jobs that pay above minimum wages and provide people with the ability to service a home
  mortgage.
- Promoted financial counseling and classes on budgeting and money management. In PY 2014, the City continued to promote area training and educational opportunities in this area.
- Promoted linkages between housing, employment and educational systems and/or facilities.
- Promoted programs and training that help families-in-need to become more self-sufficient.
- Funded after school programs to low income students providing tutoring and college preparation for junior high school and high school students coming from families where the majority of parents never finished high school.
- Funded domestic violence and leadership training for adults and children.
- Funded vocational training and residential support for twenty two developmentally disabled adults.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City has also expressed a sincere interest and willingness to assist and participate in the Dallas Area Consortium on Homelessness. Efforts have also been made to work with the Denton County Consortium on Homelessness. The City's position on this issue will continue to be one of supporting and assisting agencies that are working to address this challenge in a coordinated and proactive manner.

The above mentioned services are provided to the homeless population, population at risk of becoming homeless and those transitioning from homelessness. The City of Carrollton also supplements the work of the various City-funded social service agencies to end chronic homelessness by promoting the preservation and maintenance of existing housing through its Minor Home Repair Program, People Helping People and Emergency Repair Grant.

#### CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

#### Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

This section is not applicable, as Carrollton does not have a public housing authority. The City also does not receive or administer funds for assisted housing. However, several surrounding communities do administer assisted housing programs to residents of Carrollton. Data on the number of Section 8 housing residents in Carrollton were not available.

#### **Dallas County Housing Authority**

The Section 8 wait list for Dallas County is 5,000 families. Currently there are 21 Carrollton residents on this waitlist.

#### **Denton County Housing Authority**

Denton County maintains 1,526 Section 8 housing vouchers for the whole county. The Section 8 wait list is closed with a five year waiting period until the end of the list is reached. Currently there are 123 Carrollton residents on the wait list.

#### CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

The City of Carrollton continues to maintain a strong emphasis on safe and affordable housing for all residents. Through the City of Carrollton Environmental Services Department there are two inspection programs geared toward maintaining rental property, one for single-family rental property and the other for multi-family rental property.

The Single-Family Rental Registration and Inspection Ordinance adopted by the City Council ensure tenants and landlords of residential rental properties are involved in maintaining single-family homes in a safe and sanitary condition. The Single-Family Rental Inspection Program is an effective way of ensuring a sustainable community and safe housing is available in all of the neighborhoods in Carrollton. The ultimate goal is to improve the overall condition of rental properties and to provide decent housing without being a blight on surrounding homes, thus helping enhance property values within the affected neighborhoods. This ordinance requires all property owners and companies who rent or lease single-family homes or duplexes in Carrollton to register those rental properties with the City and to have them inspected by the City. A review of code enforcement cases found single-family rental properties are approximately 15 percent of single family homes in Carrollton but they account for a disproportionately high percentage of neighborhood code violations. This diverts staff time from other code enforcement duties and has a negative effect on the surrounding homes. In PY 2015 Code Enforcement staff processed 83 single-family units of unsafe and substandard housing in the CDBG Target area.

The Multi-Family Inspection Program stabilizes, maintains and enhances the apartment communities and hotels in Carrollton. The program operates in partnership with the residents and management staff of those apartment communities and hotels to achieve this goal through the enforcement of Title 9, Chapter 96 of the Carrollton Code of Ordinances and the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance. The Multi-Family Inspection Program operates by performing annual inspections of apartment communities and hotels, responding to complaints about potential violations of the Carrollton Code of Ordinances and the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance, and meeting with apartment management on a regular basis to apprise them of various City Codes and regulations. Carrollton is a vital community of healthy, stable and exciting apartment communities in which people of all cultures choose to live and make a personal investment. In PY 2014 Code Enforcement staff processed 379 multi-family units of unsafe and substandard housing in the CDBG Target Area.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

**Neighborhood Empowerment Zones** 

In 2013 the City of Carrollton launched a new initiative to better address the issues of the aging housing stock. City Council approved the creation of five (5) Neighborhood Empowerment Zones in neighborhoods at the greatest risk of distress due to housing conditions, age and condition of infrastructure. The boundaries of the Neighborhood Empowerment Zones were determined to coincide with the NOTICE Neighborhoods program is already in effect.


One of the current programs for the Neighborhood Empowerment Zones waives all construction fees, including building permit fees, impact fees, platting fees, and project permit fees (fences, electrical, plumbing, etc.), within the Zones, for both commercial and residential properties to encourage repair, rehabilitation and redevelopment.

In PY 2014 the City of Carrollton added two new programs in the Neighborhood Empowerment Zones:

- Neighborhood Empowerment Zone Minor Home Repair (\$15,000 General Funds): Income
  qualifying homeowners living in one of the five Neighborhood Empowerment Zones can receive
  up to \$7,500 for exterior improvements, including items that are not on the house itself, such as
  fences, sewers and tree trimming. In PY 2014 Carrollton successfully completed two projects to
  assist low to moderate income homeowners for sewer line and drainage repairs.
- Single-Family Rehabilitation Incentive (General Funds \$8,000): Any homeowner living in a Neighborhood Empowerment Zone in a home that is at least five years old qualifies for payment equivalent to up to four years of 50 or 75 percent of municipal ad valorem property tax for improvements made to the front facing exterior of the home, including fencing and landscaping improvements. The homeowner must invest a minimum of \$2,000 and will receive a portion of the investment back. In PY 2014 Carrollton successfully completed four driveway renovation projects in the Two World Keller Springs Village N.O.T.I.C.E. area.

These concepts offer another level of support to property owners and neighborhoods in concert with the infrastructure reinvestment and targeted code enforcement efforts that are already part of each N.O.T.I.C.E. initiative.

**Neighborhood Empowerment Zones** 

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

During the 2014 program year, the City of Carrollton has continued to demonstrate its commitment to the eradication of lead-based paint hazards in the community.

For residents receiving assistance under the City's Minor Home Repair, Emergency Repair Grant and People Helping People Programs where a lead-based paint hazard is involved, the City complies with federal regulations when levels are greater than *de minimis* standards. To determine if a lead-based paint hazard is present, houses built before 1978 are tested for the presence of lead by a certified technician. In the event lead-based paint is present the City hires technicians certified in safe work practices for the removal of lead-based paint.

All CDBG-funded projects meet all applicable regulations related to lead-based paint. Residences built before 1978 utilizing the Minor Home Repair Program are tested for lead-based paint to comply with HUD requirements. In the event that lead-based paint is detected, HUD guidelines are followed including the distribution of lead-based paint information.

#### Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

During PY 2014, the City of Carrollton funded eight social service agencies to address local objectives and strategies identified in the 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan. These activities were funded from the General Fund in an amount of \$355,320. All of the agencies identified below predominantly serve persons of low-to-moderate income.

The City Council considers the award of social service contracts annually. The City of Carrollton is proud of its continued partnership with the above-identified agencies/organizations. A brief outline of the specific services and activities offered by each of the agencies listed above is included in Appendix 4.

The following table illustrates the total number and demographic characteristics of individuals served by the agencies that received funding from the City in PY 2014. Cumulatively, these agencies served 16,556 individuals in Carrollton. Of the individuals, 1,425 (nine percent) were elderly, 150 were disabled (one percent) and 4,820 (twenty-nine percent) were identified as female head of household. The numbers and types of specific services provided over the last year have not been presented in this document due to the overwhelming number of social services provided by these agencies. If more detail is needed, please contact the City's Community Development Office.

#### Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

#### Neighborhood Reinvestment - N.O.T.I.C.E. General Funds

The City's N.O.T.I.C.E. program uses general funds for one project a year in Carrollton's moderate income neighborhoods to provide safe streets, sidewalks, alleys and utility lines, similar to CDBG-funded N.O.T.I.C.E. projects. This program has been a vital change agent in the communities and it positively impacts the quality of life of the citizens. In general, the N.O.T.I.C.E. program targets financial resources for the design and implementation of all necessary street, sidewalk, and water and sewer line projects in one neighborhood at a time until the entire public infrastructure in that area has been repaired or reconstructed. In addition, the City conducts targeted and strengthened code enforcement efforts in the same neighborhood to foster a greater sense of neighborhood pride and an overall healthier community. Finally the City follows up with improvements to public parks and/or other neighborhood facilities.

• N.O.T.I.C.E. Woodlake #3 Phase I (General Funds \$1,764,167.50): Provided 4,847 linear feet of street paving, 7,250 linear feet of sidewalk and 4,500 of sewer lines for one hundred six homes on Braddons, Wellington, Kings and Rose Hill streets.

#### **Neighborhood Matching Grants**

In order to establish a more proactive municipal presence in neighborhoods across the city during PY 2014 the City increased its commitment to provide matching grants to neighborhood groups to upgrade

and restore public property. The City made available \$60,000 of general funds for Neighborhood Enhancement Matching Grants (NEMGP) in PY 2014, an increase of \$45,000 from PY 2013. The residents of Carrollton have increasingly embraced neighborhood revitalization initiatives throughout the community.


The Neighborhood Enhancement Matching Grant Program (NEMGP) is a vital element in the City's efforts to initiate reinvestment in neighborhoods throughout Carrollton. Under the program, funding is made available for improvement projects planned and requested by neighborhood groups. In the past, these projects have included entryway signage, enhanced landscaping, sign toppers and public park improvements. A central issue in fostering an expanded effort aimed at neighborhood revitalization rests on the community's ability to enlist citizen participation in the initiative.

The following neighborhoods were awarded NEMGP grants in PY 2014:

- \$15,000 Savoy of Josey Ranch Neighborhood Association for irrigation and landscaping
- \$24,000 Palisades Point Neighborhood Association for irrigation and landscaping
- \$2,500 Villages of Greenway Park HOA for light pole maintenance

The following neighborhoods were awarded NEMGP Sign Topper grants in PY 2014:

- \$400 Cambridge Estates Neighborhood
- \$650 Palisade Point Neighborhood Association
- \$1,267 Hill 'n Dale
- \$830 The Parks of Carrollton

In PY 2014 the City of Carrollton completed the Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing and will consider implementation of relevant aspects in PY 2015.

#### CR-40 - Monitoring 91.220 and 91.230

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

The City of Carrollton's Community Development Program continuously monitors programs and projects to ensure compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. Staff focuses on the following areas: environmental, financial, labor relations and programmatic.

The environmental standards and procedures that are developed and implemented include the completion of compliance checklists for all activities and the City's annual Environmental Review Record (ERR). Staff maintains a copy of the ERR available for year round public review during regular business hours in the Community Services Office at City Hall, 1945 E Jackson Road.

Community Development Program staff and the City's accounting staff administer financial monitoring for all projects, programs and activities. The City's Treasury Division works closely with Community Development staff to ensure that all drawdowns are made after all ledgers and records have been reconciled and approved. The City's Purchasing Department assists with procurement and the general bidding process to ensure compliance with all applicable state and federal regulations. The financial operations and expenditures of the City are audited on an annual basis by an independent accounting firm.

The Community Services staff administers monitors and reviews labor standards on all capital improvement projects. Contractors are provided with training prior to the start of each project. All applicable Davis-Bacon and Related Acts (DBRA) are explained to the contractor. All contractor payments are contingent upon payment of proper wages to employees and the City's receipt of appropriate payroll records.

Staff in the Community Services Office carries out programmatic monitoring on a routine basis. Project and activity checklists are utilized to ensure that all requirements are met in a systematic manner.

Programs and projects administered and implemented by the City of Carrollton are monitored on a regular basis. Staff maintains project ledgers on individual projects to ensure that all required procedures have been observed and completed. A year-end report that details expenditures, revenue, beneficiary information and major accomplishments is also required for all programs and projects.

Under the Minor Home Repair, People Helping People and Emergency Repair Grant Programs staff administers and continuously monitors all projects implemented under the program. Projects requested by residents are evaluated during an on-site evaluation by staff to determine the extent of the repairs needed. Use of specialized contractors ensures that the quality of services is maintained at the highest

level.

In addition, the Minor Home Repair program partners closely with Metrocrest Services (MS). This partnership is a key to identifying and delivering services under this program. MS provide referrals and conducts the intake and processing of all applicants. By partnering non-profit agencies, the City of Carrollton reduces administration burdens but is able to maximize program effectiveness.

In 2003, the City implemented a strategic business planning process and currently the Community Services Division operates and updates its own strategic business plan. Review and updates to the plan are completed on an annual basis. All activities are reviewed on quarterly basis and a Performance Management Plan is completed each quarter to track the program work plan and measure progress toward division goals.

#### Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

To ensure general citizen participation in the PY 2014 Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) process, the City followed its adopted 2009-2014 Citizen Participation Plan. Information on the public hearing was developed and distributed to City Council, Neighborhood Advisory Commission (NAC) and the City's website. Notices were also published in the Carrollton *Star-Leader*, the local newspaper of record.

Citizen participation is highly encouraged during the review period. Public hearing notices are published at least two weeks prior to each public hearing. Citizen participation is welcomed in-person at the public hearing and in writing by mail, email and fax. One public hearing notice is published before the NAC meeting and another public hearing notification is published before the Council public hearing.

#### **Public Comments**

Citizens are encouraged to offer input regarding the City's use of CDBG funds and several opportunities are available for input, including public hearings.

#### **Advertising**

After the CAPER PY 2014 was drafted, an advertisement was placed in the *Carrollton Star-Leader* summarizing the plan and announcing that the plan was available for public review. All public announcements are posted at City Hall and on the City's website. Language translation services at meetings as well as in general informational sessions are available and provided if requested. Public hearings are held at City facilities which are ADA compliant.

Instructions were also provided on how to submit comments regarding the document. The

advertisement included pertinent information on upcoming public hearings. All comments were addressed before submitting the plan to HUD.

### Neighborhood Advisory Commission (NAC) Public Hearing - November 12, 2015

On November 12, 2015, the Neighborhood Advisory Commission (NAC) held a public hearing to receive comments on the draft PY 2014 CAPER. Having heard all comments, the NAC voted unanimously to accept the report and transmit a draft version to the City Council for final action.

Public comments received are as follows:

Prior to or during the November 12, 2015 Public Hearing, no public comments, spoken or otherwise, were received by the NAC on the PY 2014 CAPER.

City Council – Public Hearing – December 15, 2015

On December 15, 2015, the City Council held a public hearing to receive comments on the draft PY 2014 CAPER and, after receiving all comments, the City Council closed the public hearing and voted to adopt the report by resolution and transmit a final version of the document to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Public comments received during the December 15, 2015 public hearing are as follows:

- Prior to the actual public hearing, no public comments, spoken or otherwise, were received by the City Council on the PY 2014 CAPER.
- During the December 15, 2015 public hearing, no public comments, spoken or otherwise, were received by the City Council on the PY 2014 CAPER.

No other comments, spoken or otherwise, were received by the City Council prior to, during or after the public hearing process.
