



City of Carrollton Budget Summary 2024

The City of Carrollton adopted its budget on Tuesday, September 12 for Fiscal Year 2024. During this year's budget process, Council balanced the needs of the residents in combination with the operational needs of the City. The City tax rate was cut for the 10th year in a row to partially offset the increase in home values and is set for the next fiscal year as $\sqrt{0.55375/\sqrt{100}}$ valuation. The Fiscal Year 2024 Adopted Budget has recurring uses of funds in the Operating, Fleet Replacement and Debt Service funds totaling \$287,678,502, an increase of 4.14% from the previous Fiscal Year 2023 Budget.

*Average taxable value based on tax rate/\$100 valuation.




Homeowners age 65+ or with proof of disability qualify for an \$87,000 exemption off

The City funds infrastructure projects in a variety of methods. Over 60% of the annual capital budget is funded through pay-as-you-go funding. The ★ indicates a source of funding for infrastructure projects.

FY24 General Fund \$131.5 million

The General Fund is the City's main operating fund, containing the majority of revenues, operating expenditures, and departmental budgets.

Funded over \$120m in Capital Projects including parks improvements, a Library Amenity Fund, Facility Improvements for the Animal Shelter, a future Fire Station, and Jail updates.



Funded multiple operational changes including Fire apparatus replacements, new equipment for Public Works, and additional technology improvements for data warehouses and record storage software.



Effective October 1, 2023, Solid Waste collection services for residential services will increase per month to \$23.15 for base services and \$9.33 for an extra trash container based on contractual increases from the Republic Waste contract.



This year's budget includes a programmed 5% compensation increase for staff and a restructure to the Civil Service pay plan for sworn Police and Fire employees.



Carrollton is improving flood control and water quality with a three-year storm water drainage system analysis, EPA Lead and Copper Rule compliance, and a water and sewer capital refresh. New water and sewer rates will be evaluated in November 2023 with an effective date of January 1, 2024.
